## James 1:9-11

The identity of the rich man: believer or unbeliever?

**9** But let the brother of humble circumstances glory in his high position; 10 and *let* the rich man *glory* in his humiliation,

On the surface, it might seem that only the poor man is a believer. However, if we lay out the passage, something very interesting appears.

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^9Καυχάσθω δὲ ὁ ἀδελφὸς ^6 ταπεινὸς ἐν τῷ ὕψει αὐτοῦ, ^{10} ὁ δὲ πλούσιος ἐν τῷ ταπεινώσει αὐτοῦ
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The balanced structure strongly implies that the two articular adjectives ( $\delta \tau \alpha \pi \epsilon \iota v \delta \varsigma ...$  and  $\delta \tau \lambda o \iota \sigma \iota o \varsigma$ ) are governed by the same noun "brother" ( $\delta \dot{\alpha} \delta \epsilon \lambda \phi \delta \varsigma$ ). In other words, James is addressing both the rich brother and the poor one.

The fact that the rich man is said to ultimately fade away (1:10b,11) is a further description of the image of a fading flower. It is not a theological comment on whether or not he is a believer.
